Children develop speech sounds at different rates. When children first learn to speak, they may pronounce sounds incorrectly as they are learning; for instance, a 3 year old may say "wabbit" instead of "rabbit." Some speech sound errors are considered age appropriate. Others are considered a speech sound disorder. This chart represents the age at which 90% of children have mastered particular sounds, some children may demonstrate mastery at a younger age. If you feel that your child is more difficult to understand this his/her peers, an assessment by a speech/language pathologist may be warranted.
